



Brownfield/ Greyfield Redevelopment

Brownfields and greyfields are sites that are abandoned or underused industrial and commercial facilities available for re-use. Expansion or redevelopment of such a facility may be complicated by real or perceived environmental contaminations. However, these types of property are perfect for redevelopment. Whether it's an abandoned landfill site or an abandoned big box center that needs new life, brownfield and greyfield development revitalizes areas that otherwise go overlooked.

The environmental benefits to restoring brownfields and greyfields have a tremendous effect on human health as well as economic benefits of creating new opportunities for business and greenspace within communities. To date, the county has redeveloped a brownfield site at the Sanitation Division's Central Transfer Station from what was once an old landfill. And the county's Fleet Maintenance Division has a new home in a previously abandoned big box greyfield on Memorial Drive.

The county's Natural Resources Management Office recently received a Limitation of Liability under the Georgia Brownfields Program to mitigate 4.7 acres of property in DeKalb. In 2012, the Office of Economic Development received a similar grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency for \$900,000 to issue loans and sub-grants to clean up brownfield sites, encourage redevelopment, create jobs, and most importantly, protect human health and the environment.

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Endangered Plants at Davidson-Arabia Mountain: Black-spore Quillwort and Pool Sprite



DeKalb County's Natural Resources Management Office received a grant from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, a Bureau in the Department of Interior, for habitat restoration at Davidson-Arabia Mountain Nature Preserve in DeKalb County, Georgia. The project will focus on increasing the plant populations of the Black-spore Quillwort and Pool Sprite, while improving the populations resiliency and potential for recovery.

The Black-spore Quillwort and Pool Sprite were listed as threatened and endangered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in 1988. Both species have been found on Arabia Mountain's granite outcrops. Presently, there are five populations of Black-spore Quillwort in the State of Georgia; one population being located on Arabia Mountain within six pools on its granite outcrop. Due to the continued destruction of the Black-spore Quillwort's habitat, the species now only survives in nine locations around the world.

Pool Sprite is endemic to shallow, rock-rimmed, flat-bottomed solution pools on granite outcrop communities. Comprehensive surveys have been conducted throughout the species' range and presently 40 sites of pool sprites have been identified. One or two extensive populations, consisting of 15 to 20 pools, are located on Arabia Mountain.

Quarrying continues to destroy granite outcrops and plant populations of Black-spore Quillwort and Pool Sprite. Additional threats to the species include littering, trash dumping, fire building, vandalism and off-road vehicles. These species are vulnerable due to their limited amount of potential habitat and specialized microhabitats that they require. However, the protected habitat at Davidson-Arabia Mountain Nature Preserve is vital for the recovery of the Black-spore Quillwort and Pool Sprite.
