

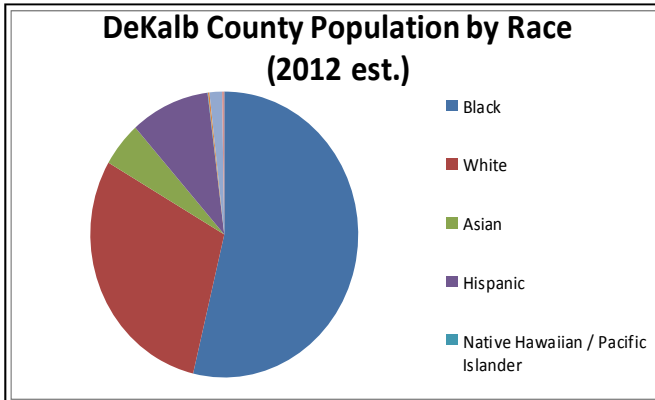


DeKalb County, Georgia Snapshot



DeKalb County was formed in 1822 and named after Baron Johan DeKalb, who was a general with the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War. According to 2012 Census estimates, it is the fourth most populous county in Georgia as well as the fourth most populous in the 10-county Atlanta region. At 268 square miles, 173 acres, and 2,555 person per square mile, DeKalb County is the most densely populated county in the state.

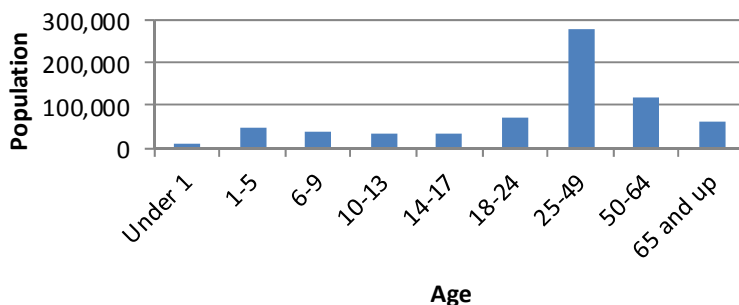
