
MBK COMMUNITY CHALLENGE!!

The MBK Community Challenge, is an effort by the White House to encourage communities (cities, counties, suburbs, rural municipalities, and tribal nations) to implement a coherent cradle-to-college and career strategy aimed at improving life outcomes for all young people, consistent with the goals and recommendations of the Task Force's, to ensure that all youth can achieve their full potential, regardless of who they are, where they come from, or the

circumstances into which they are born. The Challenge is not a new federal program, but rather a call to action for leaders of communities across the Nation to build and execute comprehensive strategies that ensure all young people in our community are positioned to succeed. DeKalb County's ICEO Lee May accepted this challenge an believes it could be a turning point for renewing our communities' belief in boys and young men of color.




A Change Generation

A Change Generation is a nonprofit independent living program provided for foster care youth ages 18-21, designed to improve their transition into adulthood. The overall goal of the independent living program is that the youth served, will be better prepared to live independently in their transition to adulthood.


A Change Generation house eight individuals that will be selected based upon their perceived ability for success. The living quarters will consist of two 3-bedroom apartment dwellings with four clients per apartment. There will be an office within close proximity that will serve as the locale for life skills training sessions. A Change Generation will provide a holistic staff approach, in conjunction with a designated success coach to assist youth in developing skills in four distinct areas:

- : Daily Living Skills: A best practice approach to teaching self-discipline, critical thinking skills, and personal wellness to apply to daily living;
- : Educational Development: Based upon each individual's needs, assistance will be provided involving tutoring, GED preparation or applying to higher education institutions;
- : Employment/Career Planning: Reenacting real world scenarios involving interviewing and proper work ethic. Clients will be taught how to create a resume and seeking the proper job according to individual skillset;
- : Financial Planning: Clients will be taught the importance of budgeting, paying bills, building credit and saving.









The Summer Reading Program promotes literacy skills and vocabulary enrichment in children ages 5 to 12 during the Camp Superstars summer camp at all recreation centers. Summer day campers enjoyed reading sessions with special guests Interim CEO Lee May, Solicitor General Sherry Boston, and Director of Recreation, Parks and Cultural Affairs, Roy Wilson.
