III. DISCUSSION

Speed Humps

-presentation provided by Director Lemke

Question LCJ: What is the definition of a predetermined affected area?

Lemke: Residents/properties that are adjacent to area or residents who are also mostly to be effected based on traffic pattern of the area

Question LCJ: Maintenance fees are in perpetuity

Lemke: Yes unless the speed hump is removed

-Question LCJ: do you have data on the requests for traffic calming?

Keeter: We can get the numbers. The requests have gone up since working from home has become more common.

Question LCJ: How do traffic calming calls come to you?

Ketter: Direct to office. So they find us online or are repeat customers

-Ouestion TT: at what point was the tax district created?

Allen: The original funding for the program in 95-97 came through HOST Funding.

Question TT: DeKalb has in-house crews for the installment of speed tables?

Allen: we have one inhouse crew that does installment and maintenance we also have an all call contractor that assist in times in higher workloads. Additional comments provided

Ouestion TT: Why wouldn't the SPLOST contract for paving also not include replacement of speed tables?

Allen: that is a function of maintenance. Additional comments provided

Question TT: What is the long term liability of this fund at 25\$ per household. How to we insure the Maintenance fund has enough funds to continue long term services of the speed tables.

Question LCJ: I echo some of the concerns raised; the question raised is if we are going in and resurfacing roads as apart of SPLOST why are we then using road maintenance dollars instead of SPLOST dollars? Also please clarify, even though we are seeing an increase you are not currently operating in the rears?

Lemke: No we are currently not in the rears due to our fund balances. Looking into the future to decide what we want to do and if our funds are suffience, we are looking to see if the trend line is there. It's hard to justify fee increases with a significant fund balance. It the request trends level off at a high peak then yes we should consider increase fees and other logistics. Question TT: If the fee hasn't changed in 20 years then at the very least index it to inflation. IT sees like we are catching up from the past 3 years, it would seem to me we would want to rationalized our fees and costs. My request is to consider adjusting the fee to the actual cost so we are not pulling other resources in the future.

TT Request: review and consider how we accommodate other requests outside of speed tables within reason. We say we have other options but when we speak to residents of some of these neighborhoods it sounds the opposite.

Lemke: there are procedures for alternate types of speed control/calming activities in the process. After the initial petitions has met the requirements of the traffic study then transportation will make their recommendations including any alternatives that could accommodate induvial neighborhood needs. A lot of time that is speed tables.

TT: I believe the underlying goal of these requests is safety and people feeling safe to move within their communities. I want us to focus on other alternatives and consider of neighborhood wide alternatives/systems.

LCJ Request: a separate discussion of the variety of options. I would ask that you come back with the cost, show the science, bring an overview of the variety of options based on the study conducted for requests.

RP Request: Arcadus to return to committee and provide a cost estimate of what is going to take long term to keep the fund sufficiently capitalized.

Keter: Following up on Traffic calming requests; in 2022 we did 90 initial interest petitions and 94 traffic studies.

Question LCJ: Out of the 90 what is the number that meant the requirements necessary to proceed

Keter: We will provide that information in the update. Very often initial interest petitions are not returned. You need a 65%interest on those petitions. This is a very divided topics that neighborhoods really need to decide.
