MESSAGE TO THE DEKALB COUNTY CEO AND THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

In 2024, the DeKalb County Medical Examiner's Office (DCMEO) continued to experience challenges associated with the impact of the opioid crisis and deaths due to traumatic injuries; the caseload remained stable from 2023 to 2024, but death rates have not returned to pre-pandemic levels. While overdose rates from Fentanyl significantly declined across many areas of the state and country, the rates in DeKalb County remained stagnant in 2024. In addition, deaths associated with methamphetamine use increased for the first time in many years. The DCMEO's caseload remained high amid the ongoing workforce shortage among forensic pathologists. In prior years, the DCMEO sought innovative solutions to this workforce shortage and is currently the only Medical Examiner's Office in the state utilizing Forensic Physician's Assistants; the office currently employs three individuals with this specialized training. The DCMEO also initiated the process to obtain accreditation from the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education, which will allow DCMEO to partner with Morehouse School of Medicine for a Forensic Pathology Fellowship Program to increase the number of forensic pathologists trained in the country.

DCMEO is very proud of its educational environment and hosts a variety of exceptional programs to generate interest in forensics across a wide range of disciplines in medicine, public health, and criminal justice. In 2024, the office hosted medical students, pathology residents, public health master's program students, internships in forensic science, forensic anthropology, and criminal justice, and the United States Marine Corps Processing and Retrieval Unit. In addition, the role of Public Education Specialist (PES) continued to expand, and the office participated in a multitude of educational and outreach activities at many DeKalb County schools and community events. Engagement on social media platforms to provide public health and medicolegal educational information was viewed by a wideranging audience. The PES also initiated and engaged in multiple prevention events to inform the public on the continuing concerns of overdose deaths, and the office developed a partnership with Claratel Behavioral Health to pinpoint areas of the county in which opioid abuse prevention, Narcan training, and outreach would be most beneficial.

MESSAGE TO THE DEKALB COUNTY CEO AND THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS (CONTINUED)

The DCMEO continued its participation on the Cold Case Task Force with the DeKalb County District Attorney's Office, the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and many local law enforcement agencies. This collaboration, funded by Bureau of Justice grant funds acquired by the District Attorney's Office, began in 2022 and has resulted in the positive identification of 11 previously unidentified individuals since its inception.

In 2024, the DCMEO's Director, Patrick Bailey, retired after 28 years of service to DeKalb County and Director Beoncia Loveless assumed the position. DeKalb County CEO Michael Thurmond also retired. The DCMEO extends sincere gratitude to Chief Executive Officer Michael Thurmond and Director Bailey for their years of service and looks forward to the continued support from the Board of Commissioners. The office is excited to partner with incoming CEO Lorraine Cochran-Johnson as she implements her vision for DeKalb County.

The DeKalb County Medical Examiners Office performs investigations, post mortem examinations, and forensic scientific testing into deaths that are reported under the provisions of the Georgia Death Investigation Act.

Mission Statement

DeKalb County Medical Examiner's Office will provide comprehensive professional forensic death investigations and conduct thorough post mortem examinations within our jurisdiction, for it is not justice that we seek, but the truth in death so that justice may be served.

JURISDICTION

The DeKalb County Medical Examiner's Office (DCMEO) serves all incorporated and unincorporated areas within DeKalb County. In 2024, these areas included all, or parts of, the cities of Atlanta, Avondale, Brookhaven, Chamblee, Clarkston, Decatur, Doraville, Dunwoody, Lithonia, Pine Lake, Stone Mountain, Stone Crest, and Tucker. The DCMEO works with all city and county law enforcement entities as well as the Georgia Bureau of Investigation, Georgia State Patrol, MARTA, and post-secondary educational institutions campus police/law enforcements agencies.

As per State Law, deaths occuring on state-owned and/or state-leased property may be investigated by the State Medical Examiner's Office (Georgia Bureau of Investigation).

The DCMEO adheres to the provisions of the Georgia Death Investigation Act (§ 45-16-20).

GEORGIA DEATH INVESTIGATION ACT

The Georgia statute describing the duties of Medical Examiners in Georgia is detailed within the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, Title 45, Chapter 16, titled the "Georgia Death Investigations Act."

The type of death(s) required to be reported to the Medical Examiner include:

- All violent deaths, which includes all homicides, suicides, and accidents
- Sudden when in apparent good health
- When unattended by a physician
- Suspicious or unusual
- Children after live birth but before seven years of age if death is unexpected or unexplained
- Executions pursuant to the death penalty
- Patient of a state hospital, or inmate of a state, county, or city penal institution
- Admitted to hospital unconscious and dying within 24 hours without regaining conciousness
- As a result of an apparent drug overdose;
- Who is a pregnant female or a female who was pregnant within 365 days prior to such female's death; provided, however, that this paragraph shall not apply to a female whose death resulted from an incidental or accidental cause, including a motor vehicle accident, or from any other event or condition where it is apparent that the death was not causally related to the care of or physiology of pregnancy or its maintenance; or
- When unattended by a physician.

GEORGIA DEATH INVESTIGATION ACT (CONTINUED)

When a death is reported to DCMEO, jurisdiction is either accepted (AJ) or declined (DJ). If a case is accepted, the Medical Examiner will certify the cause and manner of death and sign the death certificate.

A death case is accepted if it meets the criteria specified in the Georgia Death Investigation Act, and:

- The agonal event(s) that caused and/or contributed to death occurred in DeKalb County, or
- If the place of incident or onset of fatal events is unknown, and the death occurred or the decedent was found in DeKalb County

A death case may be declined if:

- The event(s) that caused or contributed to death did not occur in DeKalb County
- The deceased was attended by a physician and/or was under hospice care at the time of death.

Decisions about performing autopsies that are not legally mandated are left to the discretion of the Medical Examiner.




GENERAL RESPONSE

When a death is reported to DCMEO, the case is assigned a sequential case number.

Basic information is obtained on all reported cases. Medical Examiner's Investigators, in consultation with the Medical Examiner, make decisions about whether jurisdiction should be accepted or declined.

The Medical Examiner then makes decisions about the type of examination conducted and the extent of additional testing performed.



Cases Reported Accepted Cases Declined Cases








DEATHS BY AGE GROUP






MANNER OF DEATH BY MEDICAL EXAMINER



DRUGS THAT CONTRIBUTED TO DEATH


Total Drug-Related Deaths: 203

COMPARISON OF DRUGS THAT CONTRIBUTED TO DEATH 2020 - 2024






