(zera'-scape) Your best bet for a beautiful, environmentally-friendly, drought-proof yard. Xeriscape™ is easy, when you know how.

Follow these seven steps:

- 1. Plan and design your landscaping with water conservation in mind.
- 2. Create practical turf areas using drought-tolerant grass appropriate to your needs and the area. Your landscaping will be far more interesting with far less turf. It will also be more water efficient and easier to maintain.
- 3. Choose your plants carefully. They should be grouped according to sunlight and water needs. Use drought-tolerant plants that require less water. Many plants that are drought-tolerant also attract fewer pests. That means less pesticide for you and the environment.
- Supplement your soil with compost or other amendments—the county extension service can help you know your soil and understand what works best.
- 5. Use mulch. It looks good, reduces weed growth, minimizes erosion and doesn't need to be watered.
- Irrigate smart. Use the water you need just design your landscape so that you need much less.
- 7. Pay attention! You've designed and built a beautiful landscape that is environmentally-friendly and drought-proof. Now all you have to do is maintain it. Water only when necessary, mow, weed and prune when you need to.
